Airport Manager Report:

Mother Nature has once again officially dealt us winter operations. As in past years, the west half of runway 18-36, with tear drops on both ends, will be snow blown. The east half as well as runway 9-27 will be left alone for ski operations. Please use the tear drops for your warm up/run ups if the main ramp is



congested, and plan on runway taxi-backs. Please announce your intentions when taking the runway and, if in the pattern, allow for proper spacing in order to have a clear runway for landing. When in doubt of the airport condition, call ahead and check FAA "NOTAMS". "Situational Awareness"

We will be offering a private pilot ground school again this winter beginning February 17th on Monday and Thursday evenings. Call (507.645.4030)

The flight school has had a great year in 2019 including one solo and two additional tail wheel endorsements in November.



Stanton wants you to VOO!!!!

Stanton Airfield relies very heavily on its cadre of Volunteer Operation Officers - VOOs. Aside from the clear benefit to customers of having an aviation enthusiast as the point person on the front desk, there is the major benefit to Stanton in that a VOO on duty allows Stanton employees to concentrate on revenue-generating activities ranging from aircraft maintenance to flight training. This helps support a level of financial stability that in turn makes for a financially strong Stanton Airfield. And that results in maintaining the unique aviating experience Stanton provides today as well as preserving it for the future.

Today, Stanton is short on its supply of VOOs. This shortage is having an impact on the face we present to the public and the work flow around the airfield. The following is a description of what duties are and are not expected of a VOO at Stanton:

- VOO duty is relatively light work. The focus is on 1) Answering phones, 2) Booking aircraft and training on the calendar, 3) Checking out a customer when

they purchase fuel, complete their rental, or complete their training, 4)
Filling up planes at the gas pumps or supervising the owner's refueling, 5)
General meet and greet with visitors and customers, and 6) Light custodial duty, ensuring a great first impression of our historic airfield.



- VOO duty does not include hand-propping engines or moving aircraft in and out of the hangars. All of that is best left to the staff who do it daily.
- VOO duty is flexible. The ideal coverage is from first flight in the morning to the end of the day, but this is a very long day and is rarely the case for the VOOs. We are grateful for a few hours during the day, particularly in the mid-morning to mid-afternoon period. And it does not have to be a specific time slot every week, or each and every week for that matter.
- VOO training is on-the-job-training. The routine of the front counter is easy to pick up.

- VOO scheduling is straight forward. VOOs are scheduled on the Goboko system we use for aircraft rental and flight training. You can pull it down on your cell phone or computer. If there is no VOO scheduled, then we are in need of one. And a quick call to the airfield gets you on the calendar.
